# UPDATES FROM THE VILLAGE

## A Commitment to Success



In our usual newsletters, we highlight the achievements of the past year or upcoming projects in the village. However, for this edition, we wanted to take a step back and reflect on the broader progress and numerous accomplishments we've experienced over a longer period. While many local boards and councils across the state face regular turnover and struggle to maintain consistent goals and direction, Johnson Creek has benefited from a stable Village Board, with an average tenure of over seven years. The current Village Board consists of seven members, including Village President John Swisher and Village Trustees Erik Burns, Bev Deppe, Rooney Freimund, David Rousayne, Mike Saindon,

and Tim Semo. This continuity has enabled our dedicated board members to focus on steady infrastructure improvements, equipment upgrades aligned with a strategic borrowing plan, and prioritizing public safety — all while keeping the village tax rate at a reasonable level.

Over the years, the Village Board has successfully planned and executed several large, impactful projects, while also maintaining consistent funding for ongoing maintenance efforts. One of the significant achievements was the southeast neighborhood project, which completely overhauled several streets, addressing some of the oldest infrastructure in the village. Additionally, the Gosdeck Bridge is now in place and nearing completion, many years after the need for a north-south connection was first identified. The village's utilities have also benefited from key improvements, including the removal of a bottleneck in the wastewater system near the three-way stop at the railroad bridge, increased capacity in the main line leading to the treatment plant, and the introduction of more efficient treatment technology. In addition to these major projects, maintenance efforts such as paving on Aztalan Street, Jefferson Street, and Hartwig Boulevard have been completed, while other streets have been treated with crack filling and surface treatments to extend their life until a full repaving is required. Furthermore, the roofs at both the Police Department and Community Center were replaced after many years of service, ensuring these facilities are well positioned for the future.

In addition to the infrastructure improvements, the Village Board has made significant investments in the equipment necessary to support the work of our various departments. The Public Works Department has replaced pickup trucks that served for 20 years, acquired a new dump truck/snow plow, purchased new lawnmowers, and replaced the front-end loader. The Fire Department has recently added a brand-new fire engine, secured and outfitted a new UTV (with assistance from Rob's Performance Motorsports), purchased a dealer's show ambulance, and replaced critical equipment such as heart monitors, vehicle rescue tools, and SCBAs (self-contained breathing apparatuses) for our firefighters. Meanwhile, the Police Department continues to refresh its fleet by rotating in new squad cars, and this year, we've expanded with an additional squad car to enhance our service capabilities.

Public safety has long been a priority for the Village Board. For example, shortly after the creation of a combined Fire & EMS Department in 2007, we upgraded to a Paramedic service level, expanding the range of lifesaving services available to our community. We have maintained this licensure and strengthened our workforce with full-time staff to ensure high-quality service throughout the area. Currently, our team includes a full-time Fire Chief who is also a Paramedic, as well as two additional full-time Paramedics. In addition to our full-time staff, we

are supported by a dedicated group of EMTs and Paramedics who provide coverage across various shifts.

The Village Board has also worked tirelessly to enhance and expand our Police Department coverage, significantly increasing the annual hours for part-time Police Officers and the part-time Sergeant. In 2024, we transitioned a portion of those hours to fund an additional full-time patrol officer position, expanding our sworn-in personnel. While part-time hours were reduced in 2024 to accommodate this change, the Village Board's commitment is evident, as they approved an 8.6% increase in part-time Police Officer hours for 2025. We are grateful for the dedicated emergency services that help keep our community safe.

In addition to the significant infrastructure improvements, equipment purchases, and public safety enhancements, the Village Board has worked to improve amenities for our community. Several of our elected officials were on the board in 2015 when Centennial Park featured a large "parking area" made of crushed asphalt, with no lighting or markings. While the fields were nice, they were often too wet in the early season or after rain, leading to many canceled games and practices. By the summer of 2016, the board had installed a new parking lot and lighting, greatly improving the park's appearance. That fall, the Village Board also took action to install drain tile in both ball diamonds at Centennial Park to improve drainage and playing conditions. Since then, the fields have been significantly more usable early in the season, and the park looks fantastic. On the east side of the community, Bell Park, a popular spot for kids playing soccer, enjoying the playground, and spending time with their families, faced challenges due to the lack of restroom facilities. The only option was a portable toilet, which was inconvenient for both parents and children. The Village Board researched various solutions, receiving high-cost quotes for pavilionstyle buildings. When those options didn't fit the budget, the Board found a more affordable solution - pre-cast buildings — allowing for the installation of a sidewalk and a restroom facility, enhancing the park experience for everyone. Most recently, the Board was able to secure a grant from the State of Wisconsin, along with other funding, to develop a brand-new park: Crossroads Landing. This pet-friendly park, located on Rock River, features a kayak launch, paved walking paths, restrooms, a playground, and a small gazebo overlooking the river. It's a wonderful place to relax, whether you're spending time alone, with your pet, or with your family.

We highlighted many improvements happening above and below ground, along with the visible changes in our parks and equipment for our departments. However, one important area the Village Board prioritizes — though it may not always get the attention it deserves — is the business community. The Village Board has worked hard to establish themselves as trusted and reliable partners, fostering an environment where investments are welcomed and supported. As a result, we've seen both large and small companies building or expanding their operations in Johnson Creek. Some of these companies include JWR, Mastermold, Doosan Bobcat, TREK, Grandpa Glenn's, Qdoba/Starbucks, Taco Bell, AutoZone, Baseman Bros, Camera Source, Hoof Health, Kwik Trip, Kearns, The View, Three Oaks Health, Rob's Performance Motorsports, Rock River Power Sports, Johnson Creek Veterinary Care, and the Johnson Creek Dental Group. This level of development requires a solid commitment to maintaining the core character and values of our community while supporting thoughtful, planned growth. These successful policies can be attributed to the leadership of elected officials like the Village President and Village Trustees.

This look back has been somewhat lengthy, but it has been insightful for me to reflect on all that has been accomplished and how much things have improved over the years. It's clear how impactful the Village Board has been in driving these changes.

One final point worth noting — especially after detailing the ways the Village Board has allocated money and resources — is that the village tax rate remains the lowest among similar communities in the area. When comparing the municipal-only fair value mill rate (pre-credit) displayed on the tax bills of other similar communities in Jefferson County, we are significantly lower. At the same time, the Village Board is not simply maintaining the status quo to avoid expenses. They continue to make thoughtful improvements and approach projects strategically, ensuring that Johnson Creek moves forward with planned enhancements each week, each month, and each year.

Can't make it during business hours? Place a copy of the vaccination information with payment and a self-addressed, stamped envelope in the night box at Village Hall and we will mail the license tag to you.


